The Year in Review

As we review the past year, let's look back at our goals. Number one: Sustain the organization financially. Number two: Expand efforts to partner with regional, national and state parks. Number three: Ramp up fund raising to ensure world-class visitor experiences. Number four: Initiate community outreach efforts.

Our accomplishments in these areas are detailed throughout the annual report. Financially, our divisions successfully managed expenses and investments grew. Presidential Parking and the Mount Rushmore Bookstores had record sales, and Mount Rushmore Memories was opened in Hill City to provide additional revenue and, therefore, future funding for the park. Through our different divisions, the organization contributed more than \$432,700 to the park for a variety of different projects, including \$100,000 to sculpture maintenance and \$35,000 to the Evening Lighting Ceremony.

Regarding partnerships, representatives from regional park associations met with the *Rapid City Journal* in May to tell our collective story of how organizations like ours impact

the economy and tourism of the Black Hills. As a result, we increased our visibility in the media.

In fundraising news, we reached 86% of our goal for constructing the Youth Exploration Area shelter. We are confident that we will reach our goal and anticipate a groundbreaking by May, 2014.

Lastly, we were involved in the community by holding several annual and special events in 2013. Our new strategic plan, which is enclosed, outlines goals to remain involved with our greater community and to build a stronger relationship with the National Park Service over the next five years.

You, our partners, members, donors, volunteers, visitors and constituents are the reason for our success. We had a great year, and I am sure 2014 will shape up to be a pivotal year for us as well. Thank you for your support and for participating in the coming year. It's going to be a great ride!

The following are some highlights of the 2012-2013 year:

Gutzon Borglum Memorial Highway Re-Dedication

The Society, in partnership with the South Dakota Department of Transportation (DOT) and the National Park Service, held a re-dedication of the Gutzon Borglum Memorial Highway on June 1. Gutzon Borglum's grandson, Jim Borglum, and Mount Rushmore carver, Nick Clifford, were in attendance, among others.

The DOT designated a 10-mile segment of Hwy 244 (between the U.S. 16A junction near Keystone and the intersection with U.S. 385 south of Hill City) as the Gutzon Borglum Highway on June 1, 1973. On the 40th anniversary of the first dedication, the original Gutzon Borglum Memorial Highway sign was erected and unveiled. It had been taken down during construction decades ago.

The Society and Mount Rushmore Society member Carolyn Clifford were instrumental in making this event possible to honor the legacy of the Borglum family.

Naturalization Ceremony

Sponsored and promoted by the Society, the United States
District Court of South Dakota held a Naturalization Ceremony
at Mount Rushmore National Memorial on June 27, where

approximately 125 people from 58 countries became new American citizens. Representatives of the United States District Court, United States Citizenship & Immigration Services, the United States Marshals Service and the Department of Homeland Security participated in the ceremony, among other dignitaries.

11th Annual Presidential Dinner

The 11th annual presidential dinner—An Evening with William H. Taft—was held on November 23 at the Rushmore Plaza Civic Center. Taft was portrayed by Dale Liikala of Ohio. It was a successful dinner with approximately \$15,000 raised for future projects. The event was originally planned for October 5 but had to be re-scheduled due to a government shutdown and a severe blizzard. Since Liikala was in town during that time, he gave presentations to Rapid City Christian School and St. Thomas More about President Taft before the blizzard hit.

Membership Picnic

Society members and guests attended the annual picnic in August. It included a gourmet picnic and a presentation by former Society Executive Director Tom Griffith on the history of the organization. He was the Society's first paid executive director and spearheaded the fundraising efforts in the late

1980s that funded the park's redevelopment.

He summarized the role that the Mount Rushmore Society has played in the last eight decades during the carving, the redevelopment of the facilities in the 1990s and today. Specifically, he spoke about serving as executive director and how he, alongside the Society board and National Park Service, successfully began the campaign, which raised \$56 million for constructing the new facilities at the park, including the \$17 million parking facility that the Society operates.

"Looking back, I know we did well by doing good," he said. "We doubled the visitor length of stay at Rushmore. We moved benchmark visitation from 1.5 million to 2.5 million annually. And, as the Society still does today, we told America's story, inspired millions around the world with a message of freedom and democracy and we preserved, protected and interpreted this fantastic human accomplishment."

Society Donates \$100,000 For Sculpture Maintenance

In May, the Society donated \$100,000 to the park for continued sculpture maintenance. This is the first of five \$100,000 gifts that the Society will give to the park over the next five years to be used specifically for sculpture preservation. The funds are a result of an initial \$214,000 bequest from the Betty Nelson, Yankton, SD, estate. The Society contributed an additional \$200,000 and has managed the fund for its ultimate donation.

Society Donates \$35,000 to Evening Lighting Ceremony

Sequestration (the permanent cancellation of budgetary resources by a uniform percentage) had major impacts on national parks this last year, including Mount Rushmore.

Due to sequestration, the National Park Service considered reducing the Evening Lighting Ceremony season by four weeks

in 2013. Since this measure would have affected more than 50,000 visitors who would not have been able to experience this special program as well as surrounding communities who benefit from increased visitation, the Society donated \$35,000 to continue the program as usual.

Government Shutdown

During the government shutdown in October, all national parks closed in response to Congressional action. At South Dakota Governor Dennis Daugaard's invitation, the Society was one of 17 sponsors who committed \$15,000 to "buy a day to keep Mount Rushmore open." The parks re-opened shortly after the commitment of funds.

20 Years Old!

Bookstores Celebrate 20 Years

June, 2013, marked the 20th anniversary of the Mount Rushmore Bookstores. In 1993, the Society entered into a Memorandum of Agreement with the National Park



Service to create the Mount Rushmore History Association, now re-named the Mount Rushmore Bookstores, to operate in the park as a cooperating association. Over the years, the committee began a membership program, expanding the membership in the Society to annual, two-year and three-year memberships. A website was developed, and the organization embarked into publishing its own books with the development of *Joy at Mount Rushmore*, a children's book which is still in print and popular with visitors.

The organization originally opened one store in the Information Center, which then moved to the Lincoln Borglum Visitor Center. In 2003, a second store was again opened in the Information Center, and in 2005 a seasonal store opened in the Sculptor's Studio.

Since the inception, the Mount Rushmore Audio Tour was created, membership has grown and the number of self-published books have increased. Sales have steadily increased as well. The bookstores ended FY 2013 with sales over \$1.5 million, which exceeded the previous year by 9%. The product profit margin was at 56%.

Aid-to-the-Park Funds: \$2.5 Million in 20 Years

Since 1993, the organization has donated more than \$2.5 million back to the park to support education. The Bookstores gave \$200,667 to the park in FY 2013, which was used in the following ways:

- Amphitheater upgrades and repairs
- Curatorial supplies
- Mount Rushmore hologram
- Transportation for school groups
- Volunteers in the Park Program

- Flags for the Avenue of Flags
- Promotional rack cards for the park
- New publications
- Seasonal employees
- Badges and publications for the Junior Ranger program
- Cultural performers and re-enactors

Mount Rushmore Audio Tour Rentals

This was a banner year for audio tour rentals, as rentals were up 36.2% over FY 2012.



New Publications


The organization designed and printed the 2014 Mount Rushmore Calendar, incorporating historic photos of the Memorial. The committee also developed an ebook for *One Baby Mountain Goat*, the 2013 collectible Christmas ornament featuring Thomas Jefferson and a series of Stories in Stone products promoting national and state parks in the Black Hills.

Publishing Rights Acquired

The Bookstores acquired the publishing rights for *Mount Rushmore: Monument to America's Democracy* in 2013 and plans to update content and design for future printings. The organization also acquired from artist Marvin Houk the rights to the mold and sculptor's notes for the popular tabletop sculpture sold in the stores.

Mount Rushmore Quarter Unveiled

The U.S. Mint released the Mount Rushmore National Memorial Quarter, as the fifth in the series of the America the Beautiful Quarters program. Each year, until 2020, five new quarters will be released with reverse designs that represent



honored national sites. The Bookstore staff was instrumental in developing the educational text within the quarter packaging shown above. The organization was also a part of the official quarter launch held November 6, 2013, in Custer.

Mount Rushmore Memories

A New Enterprise

The Society expanded its retail footprint to Hill City, SD, by opening Mount Rushmore Memories June 1, 2013, at 263 Main St. next to Black Hills Harley Davidson. A portion of the



store's proceeds will support programs and projects at Mount Rushmore.

In December, 2012, the Society board voted to embark on this new enterprise to reach out to surrounding communities, provide unique items to the visiting public, provide visitor information on the Black Hills area and to create excitement for the 75th anniversary of Mount Rushmore in 2016. In 2013, staff and volunteers were involved with the planning, construction, merchandising and marketing of the store.

The seasonal store, which is open May through December, carries the same educational books and products on Mount Rushmore as the Mount Rushmore Bookstores located at the Memorial, but customers will also find additional items unique to the area on the shelves. In addition, a Visitor Information kiosk is available in the store with access to ipads, featuring a tourism app and an app that gives a behind-the-scenes look at Mount Rushmore.

In its first year, Mount Rushmore Memories held a grand opening, hosted sculptors and book signings, provided interactive visitor information, participated in community events and promotions and provided access to Mount Rushmore gifts during the government shutdown.

The entire state of South Dakota realized exactly how important Mount Rushmore is to the state's economy during the government shutdown that occurred in October, 2013. The Society remains committed to raising funds to preserve, protect and enhance this South Dakota treasure by fundraising for the Youth Exploration Area, the Mickelson Connector Trail and special projects.

Youth Exploration Area

The Society looks forward to bringing a new, permanent shelter to life for visitors in 2014. With the support of individual gifts/pledges as well as pledges and grants from the South Dakota Community Foundation, National Park Foundation, Black Hills Corporation Foundation and the Adams-Mastrovich Family Foundation, Mary Adams Mastrovich, we have raised \$340,000 of the \$396,000 needed. The Society is only \$56,000 short of the goal.

Mickelson Connector Trail

South Dakota Governor Dennis Daugaard and the South Dakota legislature deemed the Mickelson Connector Trail to Mount Rushmore as a "Legacy Project" and committed \$500,000 in matching funding if initial funding was matched

by the Mount Rushmore Society. The Society board agreed to take up the challenge of raising \$1 million for an 18-mile, proposed trail extension from the Mickelson Trail near Hill City to Mount Rushmore. This project is a partnership between the Society, National Park Service, U.S. Forest Service and South Dakota Game Fish & Parks Department. The \$9 million project will require a significant fundraising effort and will get into full swing in 2014.

Grand View Terrace Donor Wall

A donor wall, funded by the Mount Rushmore Bookstores, was

erected on the Washington side of the Grand View Terrace at Mount Rushmore last summer. Those wishing to donate \$5,000 and above may have their name or company name inscribed on the wall. Since the donor wall was unveiled, several



families have already taken advantage of this opportunity. These donors are from across the country, including South Dakota, California, Arizona, Wisconsin and Colorado.



Parking Division

Parking Shows Visitation Increase

The parking concession revenue and visitation numbers were up 2.93% and up 2.97%, respectively in FY 2013 from FY 2012.

motorcycle visitations.


We continue to maintain the parking garage by repairing pavers and concrete. We also sprayed the trees around the facility for mountain pine beetle. In addition, the following improvements were made: installed curb and gutter; provided sidewalk, traffic and parking stall striping; re-caulked plaza paver joints; installed portable "Additional Parking" signs for use during the Sturgis Rally Bike Week; upgraded computer system; and installed new computer equipment in entrance fee booths to make the operation run smoother.

State Visitation

Vehicles from South Dakota accounted for 13% of visitation, with Colorado at 8%, Minnesota at 7.5% and California at 5%. Since 2006, the same four states have remained in the top spots for vehicles parking at the Memorial. Last year, a vehicle from every state in the nation and Canada visited the park.




