A New Chapter in Visitor Engagement and Education

Earl Perez-Foust joined the Mount Rushmore National Memorial team this summer as the new Program Manager of Interpretation and Education. He oversees the interpretive and educational programs, visitor information desks and the rangers who provide the daily visitor services which help audiences discover the various meanings and significance of Mount Rushmore.

His role also includes serving as liaison between the Mount Rushmore Society and

the Mount Rushmore Bookstores located at the park. He and his team are instrumental in the review, selection and development of publications and products we sell in our stores, as well as how resources the Society provides support the park.

Earl began his park service career in 2016 at Wind Cave National Park. In fact, three out of the five parks he has worked for are in the Black Hills: Wind Cave National Park, Badlands National Park and now Mount Rushmore National Memorial! He most recently served as Program Manager for Visitor Services at Guadalupe Mountains National Park in Texas.

What most inspires him about Mount Rushmore are the visitors. "Every day, I talk with folks coming to the site for deeply personal reasons," explains Perez-Foust. "As an icon park, many people visiting the site already have strong connections to it. I think it is a testament to the special significance of the site and the Black Hills, in general."

At Mount Rushmore, Earl has the opportunity to work with people from many different backgrounds and perspectives, and this helps him identify ways to properly steward this site for the future. We are honored to partner with him in this mission of preserving and enhancing Mount Rushmore for all who visit!




In honor of National Park Week, we began a series of articles introducing you to some of the faces behind the four most famous faces at Mount Rushmore.

First up was U.S. Park Ranger Chris Chapman at Mount Rushmore National Memorial. He has been with the National Park Service for three years and at Mount Rushmore for six months. His main focus is protecting the integrity of the Memorial and supporting public safety. The position involves security and police work as well as interacting with the public every day. In his job, he may need to assist someone who is lost or having a medical emergency. He, and other law enforcement rangers, also attempt to educate our visitors on the Memorial and its regulations.

"My favorite part of the job is knowing that what we do can have a positive impact on society," says Chapman. "Mount Rushmore inspires me to become a better version of myself to serve the public more effectively."

Marvin Achtenberg has been working for the National Park Service since 1996. He worked as a seasonal employee from 1996 to 2010 at Mount Rushmore and became a permanent employee in 2010.

His job consists of helping to staff information desks, presenting interpretive programs, training and coaching seasonal employees, maintaining the park website and coordinating the publishing of park brochures and newspapers. He also works with the seasonal staff to create and schedule education programs for area schools and schedule field trip visits.

Marvin's favorite parts of the job are meeting people from all over the world and watching their varied reactions to Mount Rushmore, as well as training of new staff and seeing how they perform the job and the creative programs they develop.

"I like to give ranger talks that encourage audience engagement and that really get them thinking on a deeper level," explains Achtenberg. "I like to present talks about the presidents on Mount Rushmore as real human beings, flaws and all... they weren't very different from any of us. I hope visitors will see that any one of us might be capable of having just as large an impact on our country and the world as the four memorialized here."

The Mount Rushmore Society provides the funding for seasonal interpretive rangers at Mount Rushmore, like Matt Sweigart of Reading, Pennsylvania, through your donations and purchases at our Mount Rushmore Bookstores.

Interpretive rangers work with the permanent staff and summer interns to answer questions at the ranger desks and give educational programs to visitors during the summer season. They are on the front lines, ensuring that visitors are informed on a daily basis.

Formerly a teacher, Matt decided to make a change and join the National Park Service this year. Mount Rushmore National Memorial is his first assignment, and he has been serving as a seasonal interpretive ranger at the park since May. For the last ten years, he has visited the Black Hills off and on and is excited to work and live in an area he loves.

He has enjoyed his position for many reasons. "I enjoy working with the visitors and seeing people's emotions as they cross this bucket item off their list," explains Matt. "I also have had fun working with the kids who participate in the Junior Ranger Program."

Matt is inspired by the themes of perseverance and patriotism that are woven in the creation and enhancement of the Mount Rushmore story. At the Mount Rushmore Society, we appreciate rangers like Matt and hope you say "hi" the next time you visit the park!


We are honored to support this meaningful tradition each year and to welcome our newest fellow citizens in such a symbolic and inspiring setting.


A Presidential Conversation to Remember

City of Presidents & Visitor Info Hub at 830 Main

In summer 2022, the Mount Rushmore Society partnered with Visit Rapid City to serve as a hub for visitor information—and to help more guests experience the beloved City of Presidents walking tour.

From our downtown office at 830 Main Street, visitors picked up maps of the presidential statues, learned about the scavenger hunt, and claimed small prizes for completing it. The partnership not only welcomed guests to Rapid City but connected them to the broader story of the Black Hills.

In addition to City of Presidents materials, our office offered brochures and information about parks, attractions, restaurants, and other local experiences—helping thousands of visitors make the most of their time in the region.

Find Your Park Festival



We had a wonderful time at the 2022 Find Your Park Festival, in which 18 vendors gathered to share information about their park or outdoor-related organization. Attendees shared in some family fun and heard from cultural demonstrator Sequoia Crosswhite, Black Hills Raptor Center and rangers from Mount Rushmore, Wind Cave, Badlands and Jewel Cave.



Enhancing Visitor Experiences with the Self-Guided Tour

Since 2007, the Mount Rushmore Society has proudly operated the Mount Rushmore Self-Guided Tour: Living Memorial, a multimedia experience that helps bring the story of the Memorial to life for visitors from around the world.

Thanks to your support, this immersive tour continues to be a vital educational tool—featuring narration, interviews, historic audio, and video content. It is available in English, Spanish, French, German, and Lakota, helping thousands of guests engage more deeply with the park's history and meaning.

Proceeds from tour rentals in 2022 helped fund key educational programming at the park, including the Junior Ranger program, seasonal rangers, and interpretive internships. Every tour rented supported these mission-driven efforts—and we're grateful to all who made it possible.



Also included in the self-guided tour is the Junior Ranger Quest game, an adventure that allows kids to participate in up to 16 challenges at different tour stops around the park. Once you complete 12 of 16 challenges, show your device to a ranger at the Information Center desk, and you will receive a Junior Ranger badge, just like the written Junior Ranger program. Although it's best played at the park, the game is available as a free download on the App Store and Google Play or by searching for "Junior Ranger Quest."

Honoring Generosity on the Grand View Terrace

On September 16, 2022, the Mount Rushmore Society and the National Park Service proudly unveiled 16 new donor names engraved on the Grand View Terrace Donor Wall at Mount Rushmore National Memorial. This year's newly engraved gifts represent more than \$135,000 in support for programs and preservation at the Memorial.

Set against the iconic backdrop of the Shrine of Democracy, the ceremony celebrated a powerful tradition: recognizing private philanthropy as both a cornerstone of our national parks and a reflection of the ideals Mount Rushmore represents—freedom, democracy, and patriotism.

Each year, names are engraved on the Donor Wall to recognize contributions of \$5,000 or more to the Mount Rushmore Society, following a donation review process.
